Principal's foreword

St John Fisher College is a Catholic secondary girls' college catering for Years 7 to 12 and is administered by Brisbane Catholic Education. It is located in Bracken Ridge, one of the outer northern suburbs of the City of Brisbane, and attracts students from a large number of primary schools. In 2017 the enrolment was 534 girls. The College attracts students from a wide area across the northern suburbs of Brisbane and surrounds. Students commencing Year 7 typically came from more than 30 different primary schools. The College focuses on a holistic education with emphasis on the academic, spiritual, social, cultural, sporting and moral development of students. The 'John Fisher Way' is based on the core values include respect, care, integrity, inclusiveness, excellence and service. It offers a curriculum suited to the needs and abilities of it's students and a wide ranging co-curricular program. Located on 15 hectares of land, the College completed a new building program and refurbishment of existing facilities in 2015 and is working towards the completion of a total landscape refurbishment to include outdoor learning spaces and an environment catering specifically to the education of young women.

Characteristics of the student body

St John Fisher College is an all girls' school with an inclusive enrolment policy. The girls come from the full range of socio-economic backgrounds. Approximately half students are Catholic. In recent years there has been an increase in the number of students from multi-cultural backgrounds especially non-European. Just over eleven percent of students are identified as coming from a language background other than English and almost three % identify as indigenous.

Social climate

This College maintains a strong focus on a holistic education with a focus on academic, spiritual, social, cultural, sporting and moral development of students. It prides itself on the quality of pastoral care, both formal and informal. The formal pastoral care program offered to students in Years 7 to 10 in 2017 dealt with the contemporary issues facing today's young women with a particular focus on building resilience. All in the community are challenged to follow the 'John Fisher Way'. This is the guide to the way we treat ourselves, each other, our school work and all those people we meet on life's journey. Students are actively encouraged to become fully involved in the life of the College through the areas of their personal interest - whether that be sport, cultural, public speaking, social justice or instrumental music. The College has a strong emphasis on 'right relationships'. There is a formal Right Relationships Policy which includes procedures to prevent and respond to bullying issues. Bullying is not tolerated and all reports of bullying are treated seriously and investigated promptly and fairly. There is a permeable positive atmosphere in the student body where relationships across year levels are actively encouraged.

Curriculum - our distinctive offerings

Junior levels: Religious Education, English, Mathematics, Science, History, Geography, Business Studies, Drama, French, HPE, Home Econ - Food, Home Econ - Textiles, ICT, Music, Visual Art. Senior levels: QCAA Subjects: Biology, Business Management, Chemistry, Drama, English, French, Home Econ, Legal Studies, Mathematics A, B & C, Modern History, Music, Physical Education, Physics, Study of Religion, Visual Art.

QCAA Registered Subjects: Creative Arts, English, Communication, Hospitality, Prevocational Maths, Religion & Ethics.

VET: Certificate II in Business, Certificate II in Information, Digital Media and Technology, Certificate II Workplace Practices Students also have access to subjects offered by the Brisbane School of Distance Education. In 2017 Yr 12 IPT, Yr 12 Modern History and Yr 12 Accounting were accessed via Distance Education - sometimes due to timetable clashes.

Curriculum - our extra curricula activities

The College runs a very broad range of co-curricular activities. These include: Instrumental Music Program - wind, brass, percussion, strings, piano, guitar, College Band, String and Guitar ensembles, Vocal program - choir and vocal ensemble, Drum Corps, Theatre Sports, Interact Social Justice Club, Greedy Readers - Book Club, Scribblers - Writers Group, QDU debating/public speaking, Dance Troupe, Camps/Reflection Days/Retreats, Bracken Ridge Library Homework Initiative, College Homework Club, Art Club, Science Club. Students also participated in the Edmund Rice camp with Nudgee College. Sporting opportunities - compete in CaSSSA - swimming, athletics, cross country, netball, basketball, soccer, volleyball, AFL, touch football and indoor cricket. In 2017 the College won the CaSSSA Athletics carnival and placed 2nd in the CaSSSA swimming carnival, a testament to the talent of the student body. The AFL team made the state finals, another great achievement.

Parent, student and teacher satisfaction

Communication between home and school is highly valued in this community. Communication occurs via informal discussions, telephone calls and emails between home and school. The use of the parent portal as a communication tool was greatly enhanced in 2017 and student reports were uploaded this way in Semester 2. The College obtained feedback from parents, staff and students via the methods below and policies and procedures were amended where necessary. Feedback was obtained through staff, parent and student communication, CAP meetings and ILP reviews with parents and students, vocational education surveys and parent - teacher interviews. In general, feedback from parents indicates a high level of satisfaction. The majority of student enrolments continued to come as a result of 'word of mouth' recommendations from existing parents.

Parent engagement

Parents and caregivers continue to be an important part of the SJFC community. The College is supported by the P&F Association and prides itself on developing close partnerships between teachers and parents through:

- Parent participation in College liturgies and celebrations
- School newsletter to all parents
- Parent support of social and community events

Achievements against 2017 annual plan

A Literacy Collaborative was established to assist the meeting of the 2017 SMART goals. The SMART goal for the year was achieved by students and staff. Further developed school wide use of Moodle. The Dialogue Schools Project survey was completed by staff and parents. A school wide literacy policy was developed and enacted in 2017 to support the College commitment to improved literacy outcomes.

Future outlook

A very positive future is anticipated for St John Fisher College. We are continuing to develop our literacy strategies, and SMART goal; broaden our curriculum offerings with more pathway opportunities to meet a changing workplace environment; forward planning for QCAA initiatives; further strengthen our Catholic identity with a re engagement with a Mercy charism; pastoral care with a continued focus on resilience and well being. A master plan is being developed with a sustainability focus.

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
