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Principal's foreword

The 2021 Annual Report presents information for reporting requirements and informs the wider community of our school's operations and achievements through the year. The report includes information on the school's profile, curriculum delivery, social climate, school funding, workforce composition and student performance.

Caloundra means "place of beech tree". The original occupants of the Caloundra region were the Undumbi people who were of the Gubbi Gubbi language group. We acknowledge their unique relationship with the local area and strive to form a relationship with the local environment which reflects a similar deep respect.

Our Lady of the Rosary School is a Catholic School administered by Catholic Education in the Archdiocese of Brisbane. It is a coeducational, primary school (Prep-Year 6) located on a hilltop in Caloundra overlooking the Pacific Ocean. It is a short stroll from both Kings Beach to the south, Shelly Beach to the east and Moffat Beach to the north. Caloundra itself is located on the southern end of the Sunshine Coast just a short drive north from Brisbane. It is a very popular family holiday destination. The Glasshouse Mountains and nearby hinterlands combine with the coastal strip to highlight the rich contrasts in the landscape of the region.

The Caloundra Catholic community has been serving Sunshine Coast families through our Primary, co-educational school, since 1980. Our school was opened by the Sisters of St. Joseph under the leadership of its foundation Principal, Sr. Leonie Stortenbeker and Our Lady of the Rosary School's Parish Priest of the time, Fr. John Egan. The generosity and ingenuity of the local Catholic community, in partnership with the Archdiocese of Brisbane and local, state and federal governments ensured that basic facilities and resources were available to offer high quality, inclusive Catholic schooling for families of the Sunshine Coast Region.

Today, Our Lady of the Rosary School is in a state of ongoing renewal, energized by both the legacy of its past and by those global, national and local forces presently at work in schools. Through living our motto "to pray, to care, to share" and in partnership with our families and the broader community, Our Lady of the Rosary School helps children to develop as people of God in the world of today and tomorrow.

In more recent times, our community has engaged a futures scientist to work with our kids, families and staff to discern a Vision for our Future. The outcome of the process is a vision centred around 5 Key Focus Areas: Spirituality; Learning; Community; the Environment; and Governance. Our vision, the beliefs that underpin it and our intentions are accessible via the relevant links from the home page of our website. Facilities and resources established in more recent years reflect our commitment to realizing that vision. Our information and communication learning technologies, an integral part of our learning processes, are further evidence of same. We are currently implementing the national curriculum. We have a 1 to 1 laptop program from Years 4-7 and use iPads in the early years. As well as the regular curriculum mandated for all Catholic Schools in our Archdiocese, OLR offers students distinctive learning experiences across a range of other pursuits. These include: The Arts; Surfing;

Cultural Literacy & Language (Japanese); and Skateboarding. Extra curricula activities include Tennis, Speech & Drama, and an Instrumental Music Program.

Our Lady of the Rosary School now has a totally lay staff community. Located on the same site as the Caloundra Catholic Community church, the outdoor learning areas at Our Lady of the Rosary School include well-kept lawns and gardens; paved areas; shady trees; multi-purpose courts; sand / water / fixed play equipment areas; and an oval. Combined with our ocean views, the simplicity of our indoor learning areas and the sacred space inside our parish church, Our Lady of the Rosary School offers a unique environment in and beyond which our students and staff learn.

Our Lady of the Rosary School is built on a spirituality grounded within our Catholic tradition and MacKillop heritage with a focus on care, fun and success for all. All past and present members of our parish, school and the broader Sunshine Coast communities can take pride in the part each has played in writing the unique, unfolding story of Our Lady of the Rosary School, Caloundra

Our Lady of the Rosary School is a Catholic primary school administered through Catholic Education Archdiocese of Brisbane. Our Lady of the Rosary (OLR) offers families a sound academic education in a Catholic environment. We are a co-educational Catholic Parish school situated on the Sunshine Coast, in the picturesque beachside city of Caloundra. OLR shares with students and parents a welcoming family atmosphere, great community spirit and an active parent body. Our school has a caring, progressive staff and offers a dynamic, evolving curriculum, based on academic excellence, gospel values and spiritual awareness.

OLR was opened in 1980 by the Sisters of St Joseph and was solidly built on the Catholic tradition and the Charism of Mary MacKillop. The quote from Mary MacKillop which states, "Never see a need without doing something about it." is a firmly established 'catch-cry' at our school which often drives our purpose as a Catholic learning community.

Our student community is drawn from families who are representative of the broader Caloundra community. This is evidenced by The Index of Community Socio-Educational Advantage (ICSEA -1074). This index is compiled from: the occupation and education level of parents/carers; the socio-economic characteristics of the areas where students live; whether a school is in a metropolitan, regional or remote area; the proportion of students from a language background other than English; and the proportion of Indigenous students enrolled at the school.

Curriculum implementation

Curriculum overview

We teach the broad range of learning areas outlined in the Australian Curriculum and plan to develop the general capabilities and cross curricula priorities embedded in the curriculum. We have specialists who teach Physical Education, Technology, Japanese, Music, Visual Art, Dance and Drama from Prep to Year 6. Our students have many opportunities to participate in inter school sporting competitions and swimming classes, choir eisteddfods and a number of community events. Our students have the opportunity to participate in an Instrumental Band Program. Our key learning areas include Religious Education; English; Mathematics; Science; History; The Arts: Music, Drama, Dance, Visual Arts, Media; Health and Physical Education; Technology; Japanese (3-6).

Extra-curricular activities

At Our Lady of the Rosary School, we offer a great diversity of challenging activities. Children are given opportunities to participate in a broad spectrum of activities. These include choir; spiritual development; sport competitions; curriculum competitions; excursions; social activities; Opti-Minds; music, artistic and physical education specialists; guest speakers and leadership opportunities.

Being so close to the beach, it is important that our children participate in our Beach Safety program. The children also enjoy learning to surf. We provide an education that promotes the personal development of each child. Initiatives such as Project Compassion, Australia's Biggest Morning Tea, NADIOC week and our 'Mini Vinnies' group promote compassion for others, responsibility and self-respect for the whole school community. Parents are regularly encouraged to participate in school activities and attend Monday assembly. Family socials are regularly organised as well as holistic support offered to families. Our school is part of Sunshine Coast district representative sport. Our students aged 10-12 years are invited to trial in a variety of representative sport. This year our school won the District Cross Country. Children can nominate themselves to be part of our Opti-Minds team. Our Lady of the Rosary School has a specialist classroom music teacher. The children have access to a music specialist and instrumental program and have the opportunity to learn a variety of musical instruments including singing, percussion, guitar and keyboard. Students are also invited to become members of our choir and verse speaking groups. Children participate in our school's camp program. We also have a leadership development program that requires the students to meet weekly in ministry groups that reflect our school's vales of Faith, Compassion, Belonging and Hope. All the Year 6 students have an active part in leading our weekly assemblies. Our art teacher works with our students to develop their artistic abilities. Our school comes together to at our annual Art Exhibition, which is a highlight of the school calendar each year. During the year the children view a range of performances by the Queensland Arts Council. Book Week is an important event in the school's calendar. Classes participate in many activities that promote literacy. National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Week is celebrated. We recognise the importance of multiculturalism as our society is made up of many different cultures. The children are very active in our vegetable garden and sell produce from the garden and eggs from our chickens. The children have an opportunity to participate in the national competitions in Computing, Science, Maths and Literacy.

There are also incursion and excursion opportunities, as well as a 'Buddy' Program for students in Prep and Year 5 and in Years 1 and 6.

How information and communication technologies are used to assist learning

The vision for our use of technology in our school focuses on providing a balanced use of technology to advance student learning. A balanced usage of digital and information technology in the classroom ensures that; classroom learning shall be appropriate and reflect each year level; there is an ongoing up skilling of teachers to create meaningful curriculum and real-world learnings; a commitment to a robust resourcing budget for hardware and software; proactively engage families to support digital literacy; Measures taken to ensure safe use of technology by students and align with our school

Behaviour Matrix. There are three key objectives outlined in our ICLT policy and the use of technology within our school.

Our curriculum is also complemented by an extensive network of available technologies including interactive whiteboards or televisions in every classroom, a sound field system in every classroom, a bank of laptops and iPads available for student use in every classroom, green screen technology, and film and TV production equipment. All students in years 4 - 6 have their own device for use with their learning.

Social climate

Overview

We have very comprehensive Behaviour Management Anti-Bullying guidelines, to which all staff, students and parents commit. Our school has implemented Diocesan policies on acceptable ICT use agreements for students and staff. We participate in the annual Day of Action against Bullying and teach the Daniel Morcombe Curriculum which specify what cyber bullying is and how to address issues. The school regularly communicates to parents and the school community about cyber safety issues. We also have appropriate policies in place to deal with the use of mobile phones and other electronic devices. Our school has a number of social/emotional learning programs in place to assist students in guarding against bullying at school. The school community is kept informed of current cyber safety concerns through our school newsletter

Based on our shared values and beliefs, all learners at Our Lady of the Rosary School are invited and challenged to be and become reflective, self-directed learners. Through modelling and living out of the values according to the Catholic ethos, religious education is the umbrella that oversees and permeates all that we do. We seek to inspire children to have Jesus Christ as their model and with the help of the Holy Spirit, be the best person they can be, as God intends. OLR implements the Brisbane Diocesan Religious Education Curriculum. The religion program encompasses the four strands, with a defined focus on Scripture and understanding the 'three worlds of the text'. Our staff explore ways to develop students' understanding of Catholic Social Teachings, both in Religion and other subjects. Catholic Social Teachings aim to promote a more just and respectful approach to living one's life. Initiatives that have been introduced in the area of curriculum over the past few years have challenged the OLR's staff to review and improve programs and teaching practices. Despite the changes, our school Mission and Vision statement has remained central to our curriculum.

COVID 19 gave all schools challenges regarding promoting parent engagement. In 2021 parents did have restricted physical access to the school site; however, there were many opportunities for teacher and parent partnerships to foster. Teachers used various technologies to enhance the communication between school and home. The parents gained an appreciation into the level of planning that goes into each day.

We have an active and involved P&F Association, who work to support and build the OLR community. Our parent body continues to work tirelessly to provide a wide range of valued services for the school. The Association meets monthly and organises many social events including, Movie Nights, Thirsty Dads' Night, welcome BBQ and Mum's Night Out.

Parents are welcome partners in the education of our students at OLR and their involvement in the children's education and in the general life of Our Lady of the Rosary School are both highly valued and a vitally important part of building an effective home and school partnership. Parents and teachers are encouraged to maintain honest and open communication. The following strategies and activities provide opportunities for parents to be involved in their child's education: parent teacher meetings and evenings, participation in classroom activities, library support, reading, attendance at celebrations of learning and open classrooms, participation in prayer gatherings and liturgies, P&F meetings, social functions, play group, involvement in excursions, sports days/carnivals, and P&F fund raising events.



Description of how non-attendance is managed by the school

- In the event of children being absent, communication from the parents to the school on the morning of the absence is required. Absence notifications can be given via telephone, email or through the Parent Portal. If a notification is not received, contact may be made with parents to ensure the safety of the child. It is recommended that, where possible, the school is advised in advance or upon your child's arrival back at school. Children who arrive back without a written explanation or verbal advice from the parents will have their absence followed up.
- Children are encouraged to arrive at school at approximately 8:25am, ready to start at 8:40am. School concludes at 3:00pm. Students arriving at school after the 8:40am bell are to be accompanied by a parent to sign in at the school office and collect a late slip. When collecting your child before 3:00 pm parents are required to come via the school office to sign your child out and collect an early departure slip to give to the class teacher.
