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Principal's foreword

The 2021 Annual Report presents information for reporting requirements and informs the wider community of our school's operations and achievements through the year. The report includes information on the school's profile, curriculum delivery, social climate, school funding, workforce composition and student performance.

St Mary's School is located in the Lockyer Valley in the south-eastern corner of Queensland and approximately one hour drive west of Brisbane. St Mary's was established in 1912 by the Sisters of Mercy and has continued to provide quality education for families living in the Lockyer Valley for nearly one hundred years. St Mary's has grown in size over recent years and currently has around 259 students enrolled. Over the past seven years St Mary's School has been fully refurbished and enhanced through the construction of some new modern facilities. The grounds are picturesque and have an outlook over neighbouring farms and up the Mulgowie Valley. This outdoor play space comprises two adventure playgrounds, a large oval, a multi-purpose court and an outdoor living learning environment. Educational partnerships are highly valued at St Mary's, and we strive to engage parents and local community groups within our learning community. St Mary's is a dynamic school that values the gifts and talents of individuals and lifelong learning.

School progress towards its goals in 2021

The explicit improvement agenda for 2021 focused on gaining improvements in building a culture which upholds the Mercy Values, providing a differentiated curriculum to meet the needs of all students and building teacher capacity in interpreting data to inform literacy teaching and planning and use expected and effective practices. In 2021, we completed our BCE School Review which indicated that our school direction was in line with BCE standards and expectations. The data from the review is used to strategically map out the explicit improvement agenda which informs our direction.

The actions we took to achieve this EIA included:

- Professional Development to build teacher capacity in interpreting data
- Developed Parent Engagement Steering Committee
- Developed a strategic marketing plan.

Future outlook

Catholic Identity Goal: By the end of 2022, students and families will be familiar with the Mercy Values from our 'Mercy Way of Being Community'. Catholic Perspectives is planned for and enacted in English.

Wellbeing Goal: By the end of the year, student attendance will be above 80%.

Strategies:

- Raise awareness about the importance of student attendance through parent information nights and social media.
- Monitoring class attendance data.

Organisational Effectiveness Goal: By the end of the year, we will continue to improve enrolments across the whole school and specifically Prep 2022.

- Continuing development and implementation of the marketing plan.

St Mary's Catholic Primary School student body is represented by boys and girls aged five to thirteen years old. In 2021 the school had an enrolment of 259 students. Students draw from a vast area across the Lockyer Valley to attend St Mary's. The school is in the Lockyer Valley approximately 9km for the Warrego Highway and students live on farms and within the town itself. The student body is made up of students from very diverse backgrounds. Approximately 8% of students identify as Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander. Twelve students are from homes where English is a second language. The range of backgrounds provide an environment that is rich with culture and diverse. At St Mary's we have students enrolled who are from a variety of faiths. Including Catholic, Lutheran, Anglican and Uniting Church. Students at St Mary's have varied interests including dancing, sporting, artist, equestrian and

sporting pursuits. The St Mary's curriculum is aligned to the National Curriculum and is specifically framed to meet the needs of all students in each class. It is focused on meeting the student's academic, spiritual, physical and social needs through a range of student directed and teacher directed learning experiences. Students upon finishing their studies tend to go to Sophia College, Plainland and a small percentage go to Laidley High School and Faith Lutheran.

Curriculum implementation

Curriculum overview

At St Mary's the school curriculum is aligned to the National Curriculum and is specifically framed to meet the needs of the students in each class. It is focused on meeting the student's academic, spiritual, physical and social needs through a range of student-directed and teacher-directed learning experiences. These prepared learning experiences consider the needs of the individuals at St Mary's and are aimed to be meaningful, fun, challenging, play-based, integrated and flexible.

Staff at St Mary's actively participated in professional development that enhance student learning and development. This professional development broad ranging across the curriculum and included the areas of Mathematics, Literacy, History and Social and Emotional well-being. St Mary's continued the teaching of the Japanese language for students in Prep to Year six. In accordance with the Brisbane Catholic Education Guidelines, we aim to build "foundations for learning which are life long and life giving".

Extra-curricular activities

At St Mary's School we provide several different activities that complement the day-to-day teaching of students. These activities are an important part of school life here at St Mary's and would often not happen if it weren't for the generosity of many staff, parents and other community members.

How information and communication technologies are used to assist learning

St Mary's has continued to make ICT a priority for resourcing, learning, and teaching. The school is now equipped with up-to-date technology which is available to all students. St Mary's have a strategic digital succession plan to ensure we are supporting their learning and they are prepared for the future.



Description of how non-attendance is managed by the school

Procedure for Student Absenteeism

When a child is absent:

- Parents are to contact the school office or via parent portal on the day of the absence.
- Parents are to contact the school as early as possible and give their child's name, grade level, and reason for the absence.
- Parents should advise the school when they think their child will return.

Roll Marking

- All class rolls are marked in the morning at 8:30am
- If a child is absent at roll call and they are unexplained, parents will receive an SMS to explain reason for absences.
- Class rolls are then marked at 1:40pm

If a child is away for more than three days and their parents haven't notified the school, their classroom teacher will contact the parents to check in and offer support.

Strategies to improve Attendance:

- Informing parents and carers about the importance of attendance in school newsletter
- Speaking to students on assembly about the importance of attendance
- At the beginning of each term teachers speak with students about the importance of attendance and discuss class reward.
- Class Data is given to staff every week so they can track their progress.
