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Principal's foreword

The 2021 Annual Report presents information for reporting requirements and informs the wider community of our school's operations and achievements through the year. The report includes information on the school's profile, curriculum delivery, social climate, school funding, workforce composition and student performance.

St Joseph's Tobruk Memorial School is a co-educational, Catholic primary school (Prep-Year 6) with an enrolment of around 430 students. Our community celebrates 7 core values based on the charisms of our co-founders (Mary MacKillop, St Joseph, and The Rats of Tobruk): dignity, compassion, courage & resilience, justice, camaraderie, reconciliation, and trust and faith in God. Integrating these themes and core values into every facet of school life is both a challenge and a privilege for every member of the St Joseph's community. The spirit of Saint Mary of the Cross MacKillop infiltrates our hearts and permeates through the culture of our school. A code of conduct based on our Respect Rules (respect for self, others, environment, and learning) applies to all members of the St Joseph's community. Positive Behaviour 4 Learning and bullying prevention programs assist in creating a safe, friendly, and supportive school environment. We strive for excellence in an engaging curriculum preparing children to become active participants and life-long learners in a rapidly changing world. Co-curricular activities such as camps for Year 5 and 6, instrumental program, school band, choir and interschool sport provide opportunities for further quality educational outcomes. At St Joseph's Tobruk Memorial School, we encourage families to continue to be actively involved in their children's education through purposeful partnerships with their children's teachers and the wider school community.

Future outlook

The explicit improvement agenda for 2022 will focus on gaining improvements in:

- Through dialogue and discernment, capturing the voices across our community to outline key components of our Catholic Identity, deepening our contextual understanding relevant to our community.
- Embedding explicit learning intentions (LI) and success criteria (SC) in the areas of English, mathematics, and specialisations. Develop a consistent school wide approach embedded as our way to wholly engage students in deeper learning.
- Building community towards a deeper understanding that values and celebrates our First Nations culture and history. Formation of Reconciliation Action Plan at the local and cluster level for primary schools on Yugambeh land.
- Establishing a wellbeing framework, embed and deepen community awareness that creates safe environments that nurtures all aspects of wellbeing and learning. Improvement in attendance levels so that 90% of students are here at least 90% of the time.

The student body at St Joseph's Tobruk Memorial School is predominantly of Anglo heritage, however, cultural diversity within the school is growing at a rapid rate. St Joseph's Tobruk proudly serves community on Yugambeh land. The school draws most of its enrolments from the Beenleigh, Eagleby, Logan Reserve, Mt Warren Park, Bolivah, Tamborine Village, Windaroo, Waterford, and Eden's Landing areas. Upon the completion of Year 6, most students transition to the adjacent Trinity Catholic College for their secondary education. St Joseph's Tobruk Memorial School holds steady enrolments across all year levels. St Joseph's has around 9% EALD and 8.9% First Nations students. Strong work is undertaken by staff in leadership for senior students. Rigorous selection, induction and training processes provide excellent senior student leaders who serve for the benefit for all in the St Joseph's Tobruk Memorial School community.

Curriculum implementation

Curriculum overview

St Joseph's Tobruk Memorial School implements the Australian Curriculum and BCE approved Religious Education curriculum. The Brisbane Catholic Education Learning Framework supports the delivery of this curriculum throughout Prep to Year 6. This framework directs the school's educational undertakings and aligns with the Mission of St Joseph's Tobruk Memorial School. The beliefs that underpin learning and teaching at St Joseph's Tobruk Memorial School are articulated in the framework i.e.

- Each person is created in the image and likeness of God;
- Every person is a lifelong learner;
- Every learner is in some respect like all others, like some others, like no other.

In the context of this framework, St Joseph's Tobruk Memorial School provides comprehensive, quality, holistic, inclusive and future focused Catholic Education. Distinctive curriculum offerings include:

- Religious Education, Mass, prayer, liturgy, and outreach as components of the Religious Life of the School
- Specialist lessons in Visual Art, Music, Physical Education, Library and Language
- Sporting carnivals and inter-school Gala Sports Days
- Choir and instrumental music programs
- School camps, Swimming, Dance

Significant staffing support structures are planned across the school to assist and support the diverse range of student needs, including extension and enrichment activities.

Extra-curricular activities

St Joseph's Tobruk Memorial School provides a strong range of extra curricula activities such as:

How information and communication technologies are used to assist learning

To support the contemporary learning and teaching programs at St Joseph's Tobruk, the school allocates a significant portion of the annual budget towards hardware, software, ongoing IT maintenance and staff formation. Students in Prep to Year 2 at a minimum have 1:3 access to a current model iPad, with student in Year 3-6 having access to a 1:1 model iPad / Microsoft computer. All classrooms have modern projection devices such as interactive TV or projectors.

Social climate

Overview

A wide variety of evidence suggests that a high level of satisfaction exists within the school amongst St Joseph's School community members. Clear lines of communication are prioritised at the school, and this allows for important information to flow. Parents are encouraged to make teachers their first point of contact with any issues of concern, before speaking with relevant administration staff if necessary.

Parents and caregivers have expressed satisfaction with the approachability of staff. The existence of effective pastoral care structures and a focus on the development of the 'whole' child, is often openly praised by parents within the school community. Interestingly, many parents were once themselves St Joseph's students. The school implements strategies from the Positive Behaviour 4 Learning (PB4L) program which connects strongly with our 4 R's respect framework.

Over several years, the school has had a stable teaching staff with a high attendance rate. This strongly suggests that the school's teachers experience a true sense of vocation at St Joseph's. Student attendance rates are pleasingly high, and this strongly suggests enjoyment of school life for them.

Family and community engagement

Parents are involved in a process to assist in the formation of strategies for St Joseph's Tobruk Memorial School, in partnership with staff and the school's leadership team. These strategies, and school achievements from the previous year, are reported to the school community. The school's P&F Association provides excellent avenues for all forms of parent engagement and partnership with staff. P&F Meetings provide an excellent opportunity for members to formally report on school life, and for all attendees to provide feedback, request further information, and suggest and support initiatives within the school. Regular parent engagement with school life is strongly encouraged, as they are promoted and valued in our school community as the first educators of their children. Areas of parent engagement range from the formal educational setting to social and fundraising events.

St Joseph staff connect with our First Nations community to assist in the implementation of cross curricular perspectives, as well as supporting our developing understanding of cultural competences.

Students' diverse needs are continually evaluated and planned for. Teachers regularly connect with the Student Support Team and engage with our *Concern for a Learner* process if they feel a student requires more support.



Description of how non-attendance is managed by the school

St Joseph's Tobruk implements attendance procedures and process as outlined by BCE. Classroom / specialist teachers mark the roll daily in the morning and in the afternoon. Parents of a child who is marked with an unexplained absence are sent an SMS after roll marking is complete. Any children who are identified has having absences well below the 90% mark are sent a letter, asking parents to explain why this has occurred, or discuss strategies that could be offered to improved attendance. The school regularly refers to the importance of attendance in Newsletters and via school assemblies.
