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Principal's foreword

The 2021 Annual Report presents information for reporting requirements and informs the wider community of our school's operations and achievements through the year. The report includes information on the school's profile, curriculum delivery, social climate, school funding, workforce composition and student performance.

St Kevin's is a Catholic co-educational school. It is a warm, inviting, multicultural school, set in beautiful surroundings. We envision an environment where all are encouraged to realise and develop their Godgiven gifts that they may live happy and fulfilling lives based on the Gospel values to strengthen partnerships while nurturing and supporting each other we encourage learners of all ages to shape and enrich our changing world by contributing their gifts for the renewal of God's creation. Families are welcome to participate in all aspects of school life such as assemblies, liturgies and classroom programs such as Literacy Block. Class programs focus on the integration of religious education, personal development and values. Made available through private professionals, extra-curricular activities include art, chess, numerous sports and music (guitar, violin, keyboard and piano), with PE, French cultural awareness and language, Information Technology and the Arts an integral part of learning for our students.

School progress towards its goals in 2021

During 2021, St Kevin's set goals to:

- Embed contemporary Catholic perspectives, with a particular focus on Celtic spirituality.
- Create safe environments that nurture all aspects of well-being
- Sustain foundational practices in Literacy and Numeracy
- Grow a community that values, celebrates and responds to individual identity and cultural diversity.

Teaching staff engaged in professional learning to support embedding catholic perspectives. This was focus area in commencing the year, all staff were engaged in these experiences. In Numeracy and Literacy, work consolidated the continued progress in teaching and assessing reading and writing progress, with a growing focus on numeracy through engaging consultant Andrea Hilbrick. Our school continued to create safe and welcoming spaces for all. This became particularly important as the year was disrupted by lockdowns and families working in isolation at various times through the year.

Future outlook

In 2022 the school will use learning data from previous student achievement to set a specific, explicit improvement agenda. This agenda will see all staff working towards improving student's ability to write with creativity and engage their audience for written pieces. Our success will be measured by student achievement against the BCE monitoring tools. We look forward to seeing the achievements of students who can not only write specific text types with accuracy and skill, but also engage and entertain their reader.

Our school is home to students and families from a broad range of cultures, ethnicities and backgrounds. We are placed an urban setting and have a small component of our school community, both staff and families, who identify as Indigenous. Students of all abilities are welcomed at St Kevin's and are well supported by our Teachers, School Officers and Student Support Team.

Curriculum implementation

Curriculum overview

St Kevin's provides high-quality Catholic education for all students. Students at St Kevin's enjoy a range of experiences across all learning of the Australian Curriculum, English, Mathematics, Science, Health & Physical Education, HASS, The Arts, Technologies, Health and Physical Education and Languages. Being a Catholic school, students also access Religious Education and participate in the religious life of the school. Teachers are supported to thoroughly plan, accommodating the diverse needs of learners. The school proritises high quality planning as well as professional learning and development of skills for teachers and support staff.

Extra-curricular activities

Throughout 2021, the school's ability to offer extra-curricular activities has grown and allows the school to offer STEM clubs, singing and choral groups as well as athletics and other special interest groups. Outside providers have been able to provide increasing opportunities for students to engage with activities including:

How information and communication technologies are used to assist learning

Throughout 2020 and into 2021, the school has become skilled at using digital technologies to support learning and to maintain connections within the community. Platforms such as SeeSaw allow for safe, simple communication between Teachers and Parents/Carers. Other platforms such as Teams have

allowed Teachers to reach students and families who may be isolated during lockdowns or due to illness. The school enjoys a high ratio of devices to students who develop skills to use devices such as iPads and laptops for learning, connection and socially. BCE platforms such as the Parent Portal and BCE Connect App allow the school to connect with parents easily and reduce waste by publishing important documents digitally.

Social climate

Overview

The school enjoys a positive and supportive social climate. Thanks to our diverse population, those of all ethnicities and cultures are accepted and embraced in our community. The school acknowledges the traditional custodians of the land we gather on each day, our students incorporate the language of the Kombumerri people into everyday life at school. The school implements positive behaviour teaching and support strategies. We teach students about our expectations of their behaviour and treatment of others. Instances of bullying are dealt with in collaboration with parents, with a view to assisting students to learn and be supported. It is important that everyone feels safe and welcome in our school community. We teach students to recognise and respond to their own emotions and choices. We teach about Zones of Regulation across the school to improve interactions and build strong, positive relationships.



Description of how non-attendance is managed by the school

The school promotes and encourages regular, punctual student attendance. The school monitors student attendance maintaining records by marking rolls twice daily. Staff are encouraged to use BCE online tools or the MAWA app. Teachers are expected to follow up unexplained absences with families and maintain appropriate records. Teachers are expected to notify the leadership team when extended absences become apparent. The school promoted positive school attendance, attitudes and routines around attendance starting from Prep information sessions before students commence at school. Weekly attendance is monitored and awarded at school assembly. Families receive printed attendance reports at the end of each term to inform them of the importance of regular, punctual attendance.
